## Tell us a little about your parish

Boddington is a sleepy, rural parish, which lies four miles northwest of Cheltenham, with the hamlets of Barrow to the west, Hayden to the east and Boddington sitting centrally. Covering an area of five square miles with around 700 parishioners, it's likely home to more cows and sheep than people!

Quintessentially rural England in many ways, it is a much-treasured place to live if you don't mind being away from it all. Whilst we have one fantastic pub, we don't have any shops, schools, village halls or community centres; we don't even have any pavements.

## Places of pride

Registered as a parish in 1682, records of Boddington Manor date back to the turn of the millennium, when it was part of the Great Manor of Tewksbury. There are tales of it withstanding a short siege during the English civil war, when the manor was defended by a moat. The Church of St Mary Magdelene is our only formal public building and dates to the 12th century. With regular services, the church also opens its doors to locals every Christmas for carols, mince pies and mulled wine. Boddington is also home to ISS Boddington - formerly RAF Boddington - which sits on the edge of Barrow hamlet.

### Nature and wildlife

Our 1,271 hectares is mainly farmland with arable and cattle farming. This attracts wonderful wildlife with a range of birds such as buzzards, woodpeckers, and owls. We are also fortunate to see deer, foxes, and occasionally hares, badgers, and otters.

# What part does the parish council play in local life?

We are a close community, and organise celebrations to mark national events such as the late Queen's jubilee, the coronation, and last year we marked the 80th anniversary of D-Day with the lighting of a beacon of peace.

Volunteer litter picks are arranged from time to time, to keep our verges clean and tidy. During the last litter pick, 27 black bin bags were collected, along with a large gas cannister, a 25 litre drum of used oil, and an old toilet!

If you like the quiet life, Boddington is a wonderful place to live.

# Do you vote by post?

Changes to the law mean that a postal vote arrangement can only remain in place for a maximum of three years. Existing postal voters who applied before 31 October 2023 will soon need to re-apply.

Please look out for an email or letter from the council's Elections team in the next few weeks explaining what you need to do, and when. If you do not re-apply, your existing postal vote arrangement will be cancelled.

# government reorganisation and devolution

glish Devolution

The Government is planning two changes for local areas: **devolution**, which will see the passing of more powers and funding from central government to local authorities, and **Local Government Reorganisation** (LGR) that will see local councils streamlined into a simpler structure.

Devolution will incorporate the creation of a new strategic authority led by a directly elected mayor.

LGR will affect all councils in the county, including Gloucestershire County Council and the six districts – Tewkesbury Borough Council, Cheltenham Borough Council, Cotswold District Council, Forest of Dean District Council, Gloucester City Council, and Stroud District Council.

When Gloucestershire moves to a unitary model, the county and district/borough/city councils will be replaced, and a new unitary council or councils will deliver all the services.

Government has identified two phases to the changes. Gloucestershire is not one of the areas that will be prioritised in the first phase, however proposals are required to be submitted to the Government by November 2025.

Gloucestershire councils submitted an interim proposal in March for Government to consider. Currently, there are three proposals in development, supported by different councils.

#### The options are:

- · One unitary for the whole county
- Two unitaries, with an east (Cheltenham, Tewkesbury and Cotswold) and west (Gloucester, Forest of Dean and Stroud) split
- Two unitaries, one being the greater Gloucester city area, and the other being the remainder of the county.

voice for our region with central
Government.

While the Government will consider the proposals submitted by local authorities, the final decision will be made by Government ministers.

# **No name change** for Tewkesbury Borough

Tewkesbury Borough councillors have voted not to proceed with the proposed name change to North Gloucestershire Borough.

When the name change was initially agreed, following consultation with local communities, there was no indication that the Government would introduce LGR plans.

Considering this new direction, retaining the council's current name is the most sensible

option.





# Living in Tewkesbury: a well-loved town with a rich history

Tewkesbury is known for its deep historical roots, including the Battle of Tewkesbury, the Abbey, and many historic buildings. It even has the oldest pub in Gloucestershire!

Situated at the confluence of the rivers Severn and Avon, the town also has a beautiful landscape – but is also very prone to flooding.

Flood resilience, response and recovery is a focus area within the council plan, and with the emergency response team being stood up four times in 2024, the council is continually looking for ways to improve its approach.

## Using technology to predict floods


In January 2024, the town experienced significant flooding. To predict how rainwater could affect specific properties during severe weather events, new geospatial tools from a technology platform called 'ArcGIS' were used.

## What is geospatial?

Geospatial refers to data associated with a specific location on the Earth's surface. This data can include maps, satellite images, and other information that helps the council to understand where things are and how they relate to each other geographically.

## Satellite imagery and different datasets

During the flood event in January 2024, the council's data team used satellite images from the Sentinel-2 satellite, which takes pictures of the earth every few days. On a clear day, the extent of the flooding could be seen. The team also used data from the Environment Agency, including data from their measuring stations along the rivers, to predict water levels based on past events. The imagery and data were then combined with elevation data (how high the land is) to create a model predicting where flooding would occur. This model was quite accurate and matched what was observed on the ground.



# Helping the community

All the information gathered helped to identify which residential properties were within the flooding boundary. By cross-referencing this with data on the borough's most vulnerable properties and residents, the council could ensure that these residents received the support that they needed, such as welfare checks, medical supplies or support with getting sandbags.

"We're pleased to be making use of new technologies to better understand and respond to flooding emergencies. Gathering data from measuring stations and satellite images is crucial for us to build up historical references and find ways to improve conditions for our residents in flood-prone areas."



"Running a business is a lonely place to be - having a network of support around you really helps."

Nigel Dawson, co-owner of Cafe au Chocolat and Chocolat of Tewkesbury, opened the coffee shop with his wife, Liz, ten years ago and the chocolate shop two years later. Already familiar with the Growth Hub through their café, the couple explored support for their expanding retail business. In just one session with the Growth Hub, they uncovered Chocolat of Tewkesbury's growth potential — along with the capacity challenges holding it back.

"We already had links with local retailers and supermarkets but one of our issues was meeting capacity," explained Nigel. Further discussion revealed that the machines being used were the reason the company was struggling to meet demand for its products.



Growth Hub advisors, identified available funding via the Rural England Prosperity Fund, meaning Nigel could source and finance a more productive machine.

"The machine has more than doubled capacity, it's not just doubled the amount we can make but the amount we can make in the same time has also doubled - it's a much faster process."

"The Growth Hub has been fantastic, for any business looking to develop and improve what they are currently doing, accessing the Growth Hub is a no brainer."

### SolarGo<sub>2</sub>

"What started off in a horsebox on my drive following redundancy, has turned into a successful business, thanks to support from the Growth Hub."

Sean Gunston set up SolarGo2, selling solar security lights and then high efficiency solar panels for caravans and motorhomes, after losing his job during the pandemic.



He attended workshops and received mentoring through the Growth Hub in the early days to help grow his business.

"Any gaps that existed or information that was missing after training sessions and workshops were filled in by having a mentor." he explained.

"It meant that I had 1:1 support.

There was always someone I could contact for answers or ideas for problems I might be having.

"I had two mentors. One to help me set up the business and structure a way forward and another to help with digital marketing and online sales.

Volunteers, including children and young people, community organisations and parish councils, teamed up to transform their local parks and green spaces.

The new orchards celebrate the coronation of King Charles III, and support local tree planting projects across the borough.

Highnam, Longford, Northway, Transition Cleeve, Tewkesbury Nature Reserve, Winchcombe School, Stoke Orchard, Gretton and Alderton have all planted between five and 42 trees, including many different varieties of fruit trees including apple, pear, greengage and cherry.

# New affordable homes for families in Bishop's Cleeve

New affordable and sustainable homes are being enjoyed by families at Eversfield Close in Bishop's Cleeve. The project, initially named Crown Close, offers 28 properties, with a mix of one, two and three-bedroom homes for social rent and shared ownership.

The homes are all A-rated for Energy Performance Certificates (EPC), with gas condensing boilers, roofmounted solar PV panels to reduce space and water heating costs, and electric vehicle charging points.

"We're proud to support this new sustainable redevelopment at Crown Close. Our funding has helped improve the quality of accommodation for residents and the wide area."

The scheme was supported with £800,000 council funding from financial contributions from developers, in lieu of on-site affordable housing contributions.

The new properties bring the total number of affordable homes built in the borough to 1,151 in the last five years. Over £2.5-million has been allocated to make homes more affordable, especially for social housing. The funding will also improve accessibly and home size, and help providers use renewable energy to reduce carbon emissions and lower customer bills for customers.

The Council Plan focuses on increasing affordable housing, especially social rented homes that meet community needs.

# Community stewardship and placemaking workshops

The Garden Communities team has recently brought together local stakeholders to discuss stewardship and placemaking as part of its programme.

Information gathered from the workshops will help the team take a more coordinated approach and establish a locally owned, community-run, stewardship body. The role of the stewardship body would be to manage and take care of the Garden Community project in the future once it has been set up.

What will the stewardship body look like?

This needs to be carefully thought through and established, so we brought in expert help.

At workshops in the spring, attendees (including parish councils, developers, community leaders, and landowners) worked with architects JTP and Community Stewardship Solutions (CSS) who were commissioned by Tewkesbury Borough Council. Attendees shared their views on the challenges, aspirations and ideas from local stakeholders.

Residents and interested parties saw examples of case studies from other UK garden towns. Some of the examples shown were with limited companies, some were with not-for-profit, and some were with charities.

Attendees also considered the community assets that will be provided, and how these assets would be managed in the long term and who might own them.

"A comment that came from the workshop was 'nowhere is the same as Tewkesbury – we need a bespoke solution.' This is why stewardship is a key principle of our Tewkesbury Garden Communities Charter and why collaborating with our local stakeholders is vital."
