Tony Eardley, Chair of Ashleworth Parish Council, shares what makes this village special

Tell us a little about your parish and what makes it special

Ashleworth is a peaceful village just off the Gloucester to Ledbury Road, where walkers, cyclists and horse riders are as frequent as cars. With no main road running through it, the village enjoys a quiet charm.

At the centre of village life is the Ashleworth Hub, a thriving space with a post office and coffee shop which has licensed dining three nights a week. Nearby is the village school, dating back to 1842, which maintains close ties with the church and community.

The Grade I listed church, St Andrew and St Bartholomew, has stood for over a thousand years. It now hosts the Benefice BIG Church, an informal and welcoming service for all ages.

A vibrant and active community

Ashleworth Memorial Hall (AMH), next to the hub, is a modern, well-equipped venue run by volunteers. It hosts regular activities like yoga, pilates, and toddler groups, and is available for private hire. Thanks to council grants, AMH now has a new AV system, Wi-Fi, and a fully upgraded kitchen, used to support events like the popular monthly community lunch.

From October to March, AMH becomes a cosy cinema, screening recent films - often with a licensed bar for a relaxed evening out.

Ashleworth Woodpeckers Sports and Social Club, known as 'Woodies', has been a village favourite for over 50 years. It's home to cricket and youth football teams, skittles leagues, and even Monday night cribbage. Plans are underway to improve facilities and welcome new members.

The role of the parish council

Ashleworth Parish Council plays a vital role in village life. It reviews planning applications, works with Severn Trent on drainage, supports flood prevention, and liaises with County Highways to maintain local lanes.

The parish council also allocates Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL) funds, from the borough council, to support local projects.

Recent contributions include bird boxes and a bench for Go Wild in Ashleworth, a reflective garden and flood relief path at the church, and planned improvements at Woodies and the church.


Another fantastic example was the purchase of the village's disused red phone box for £1. It now hosts a community book exchange, maintained by the local WI, who meet monthly at AMH.

Looking ahead

Ashleworth Hub's Christmas lights are a festive highlight, but the biggest event is the Ashleworth Village Show each September. Held at the Woodpeckers Sports Ground, it's a classic country show with children's art, giant vegetables, flower displays, and entertainment for all ages. Proceeds support local groups, charities, and the church.

Residents, businesses, and community groups across Cheltenham Borough, Gloucester City and Tewkesbury Borough can see and comment on new research, in a second phase of engagement with the Strategic and Local Plan (SLP).

The latest phase of engagement, launched in October, offers everyone the chance to learn and help shape how their communities grow and evolve over the next 20 years.

This new engagement builds on the feedback gathered during 2024, which saw over 1,000 people take part. That input has helped inform the next stage of the plan, and now the councils are asking for views once again.

What is the SLP?

The Strategic and Local Plan is a shared development plan which is being created by Cheltenham Borough, Gloucester City and Tewkesbury Borough councils.

It will guide decisions on:

- Planning new homes deciding where homes should go and what types are needed
- Boosting jobs and growth creating the right conditions for local businesses to thrive
- Revitalising town centres - making them vibrant, welcoming hubs for our communities

- Improving infrastructure from roads and cycle paths to flood protection and green spaces
- Putting nature first making climate action and biodiversity central to our plans.

"The SLP will shape how our area grows, and it's essential that it reflects the needs and priorities of our communities, whilst protecting the natural and historic environment. That's why we're encouraging everyone to get involved and share their views."

What's happening now?

Visit the dedicated SLP website to read a series of research papers, some of which are designed to raise awareness, while others invite direct feedback. Each paper is open for comment for six weeks, giving people plenty of time to read, reflect, and respond.

Workshops are also being held with targeted groups, to gather feedback from those involved in housing and economic development.

How to get involved

The engagement will run until June 2026, with the draft plan due for pre-submission to government in July 2026, and final submission expected in October/November 2026. Once submitted, the plan will be publicly examined, offering another opportunity for people to have their say.

SLP Design Code give your views

As part of the SLP, the three councils are also creating a design code for new development, as required by government.

The code will be a set of simple rules to show how good design should look and feel, and how it supports community wellbeing and the environment.

Local Government reorganisat

shaping Gloucestershire's future

As we continue to prepare for Local Government Reorganisation (LGR) and devolution in Gloucestershire, all seven councils across the county - including Tewkesbury Borough Council - are working together to shape the future of local services for generations to come.

In November 2025, each council formally debated and decided which of three proposed unitary models they supported. These decisions fed into a final submission to central government, which was submitted on 28 November, as part of the national programme to simplify local government structures and devolve more powers to local areas.

The government's plan involves two major changes:

- Local Government Reorganisation (LGR):
 The current two-tier system comprising Gloucestershire County Council and six district councils will be replaced by one or more unitary authorities. These new councils will deliver all local services, from waste collection to social care, under a single structure.
- Devolution: More powers and funding will be transferred from Westminster to local areas, enabling decisions to be made closer to the communities they affect. This includes the creation of a strategic authority, likely led by a directly elected mayor, which will oversee multiple county areas.

The three unitary options

Following months of collaboration, engagement, and analysis, three unitary models have emerged as the leading options for Gloucestershire's LGR future:

1 Single county-wide unitary authority

This model would replace all seven existing councils with one unified council serving the entire county.

2 East-west split model

This proposal divides the county into two unitary authorities:

- **a.** East Gloucestershire: Cheltenham, Tewkesbury, and Cotswold.
- **b.** West Gloucestershire: Gloucester, Forest of Dean, and Stroud.
- (3) Greater Gloucester model

This option proposes:

- **a.** A Greater Gloucester unitary authority, expanding the city's boundaries to include parts of neighbouring districts.
- **b.** A second unitary covering the rest of the county.

Recent developments and next steps

At the time of going to print, the formal meetings held by Gloucestershire's councils - including Tewkesbury Borough Council - to discuss and vote on the councillors preferred unitary option had not taken place. To read more about the neighbourhood modelling, financial and economic benefits and challenges for each proposal and the latest updates on LGR in Gloucestershire visit, futuregloucestershire.org.uk.

"While LGR has been imposed by government, it offers us an opportunity to rethink how local government works in Gloucestershire. As part of this transition, we will want to ensure services are designed in a way that are more efficient, quicker to respond, but that still feel local to the people who use them. LGR presents a real opportunity to modernise how we deliver services and make them more responsive to the needs of our communities. A final LGR proposal was also submitted to the government on 28 November. The government will now assess the proposal against its criteria, which includes population size, service efficiency, financial sustainability, and local identity. This process will include a public consultation, expected to take place in early 2026."

The government will be taking views on the proposals submitted and will make a decision on which best meets their criteria, with a government-run consultation likely to be in the early part of 2026.

When approved, the new unitary structure will come into effect no earlier than April 2028.

What does this mean for you?

While the structural changes may seem complex, the goal is simple: to deliver better, more efficient services that are tailored to the needs of Gloucestershire's communities.

"By streamlining structures and working more strategically, we can improve efficiency, reduce duplication, and ensure that every pound spent delivers maximum value to our residents and businesses.

LGR is about building a stronger, more resilient Gloucestershire – one that's better equipped to meet future challenges and support local people."



The company, started in 2016 by engineer Yohan Paulin, makes high-quality metal parts for many different industries.

new manufacturing equipment.

Even with a highly skilled team, the company was finding growth difficult, due to the limitations of its existing equipment and lack of business development resources.

With guidance and support from the Growth Hub's Advanced Engineering and Manufacturing (AEM) advisors, Steve and James, the business was able to secure funding from the Rural England Prosperity Fund (REPF) to invest in two new powerful machines: a CNC Plasma Cutting Table and Hydraulic Press Brake Folding Machine.

These upgrades made a big difference, saving around 180 hours of work each year, which can now be used to grow the business.

The company expects to increase its turnover by 65 to 100 per cent and has already hired a new team member. Yohan Paulin, Founder of Perfect Fabrications, said:

"This investment has been a gamechanger. With the support of AEM advisors through The Growth Hub Tewkesbury, we've not only improved our manufacturing capabilities but also laid the foundation for sustainable growth and job creation."

Small on waste big on recycling

"We're encouraging the whole borough to support our campaign 'small on waste, big on recycling." Cllr Murray Stewart, Lead Member for Environmental Services, explains:

"Our blue recycling bins are widely used by many residents, which is fantastic – but it's surprising how much recyclable material still ends up in green waste bins. Around a quarter is food, and nearly another quarter is plastic, paper, and card all of which could be recycled.

"To tackle this, we've made a few changes. We've introduced slimmer general waste bins for residents moving to new-build properties and residents asking for replacement bins. We want to encourage smarter sorting and remind residents that they can ask for an extra blue co-mingling recycling bin or food caddies - free of charge.

"It's a small change with big potential. By helping residents recycle more and waste less, we're supporting everyday choices that protect our environment. By preventing waste, reusing what we can, and recycling more, we save valuable resources and cut harmful emissions."

Growing together: How Twyning and Norton are digging into community gardening

Something exciting is growing in Twyning and Norton, and it's not just vegetables!

In Twyning, a small group of residents has been working together for around a year, growing their own fruit and vegetables in a community garden. They've created a space where they can meet and plant, weed, water and care for the crops. Their goal is to grow everything organically, using natural methods that are kind to the earth and produce fantastic results.

One of their secret ingredients is alpaca poo. Known as 'black gold,' it's a fantastic natural fertiliser, and it comes from the alpacas that live right next to the garden.

The group is proud to be feeding themselves with fresh, healthy food. When they have extra, they share it with others in the community - either for free or for a small cost.



Meanwhile, the family at Norton Court Farm is starting a new chapter. After years of naturefriendly dairy and beef farming, they're building a farm that's good for people, animals and the planet.

The Norton Growing Space will begin to take shape in 2026, offering allotment plots for individuals and community groups, as well as shared fruit trees and a polytunnel for growing plants all year round.

The aim is to create a place where people can grow food together, regenerating soil and community, and help nature thrive.

The Norton Growing Space is working with The Growth Hub Tewkesbury to explore funding opportunities and connect with similar local projects for shared support and ideas.

"Ventures in Twyning and Norton are leading the way in community growing. Both the group and the business have some terrific ideas, passion and momentum and are growing stronger every month. I have visited both and was so impressed with the work that they are doing; we are certainly proud to have them in our borough."



Focus on youth

Homelessness



Across the UK, the main reason* young people under the age of 25 become homeless is because their family or friends can no longer give them a place to stay.

The pandemic and the cost-of-living crisis has made these problems worse, putting even more young people at risk.



"We're working hard to prevent youth homelessness in our borough. That's why we've teamed up with local charity Gloucestershire Nightstop to launch 'Firststop' - a family mediation service designed to help young people stay safe and avoid losing their home.

Most young people who become homeless say it's because of family arguments. Firststop gives families the chance to talk things through before a crisis happens."

Worried about family problems leading to homelessness for a young person?

Firststop can help

Firststop helps young people aged 16 to 25 talk things through with their families. It offers a safe space to work through difficulties, make a plan to support everyone's needs, and prevent a crisis. If a young person does need to leave home, the family mediator will support families to make sure the move is done with support and care.

They also work with professionals across Tewkesbury Borough to spot problems early and prevent homelessness before it happens.

Firststop is part of Gloucestershire Nightstop, working with Tewkesbury Borough Council to support young people and families.

Bringing a bold new vision to the Roses Theatre

Tewkesbury's much-loved Roses Theatre is entering a new era under the leadership of Derek Bond, an Olivier award-winning director, with a powerful vision to place the theatre at the very heart of the borough's community life.

Bond, who officially started his post as Chief Executive Officer (CEO) and Director in September, grew up in Evesham and remembers visiting The Roses as a boy. Now, he's eager to offer similar opportunities to young people today.

"I want every primary and secondary school in Tewkesbury to have the chance to come to our theatre," he says. "Theatregoing should be a right, and we're making The Roses the most welcoming space possible, right at the heart of our community.

"Culture brings people together and gives towns energy. For every £1 spent on a ticket, £1.40 is spent in the wider local economy. When we put on a great show in our theatre, the high street and the whole town benefits."

The Roses is strengthening its community focus to create more opportunities for local people to explore their creativity and take part in performances.

There are also plans for a new family summer show to bring professionals and the community together, and for the theatre to play a greater role in supporting borough-wide events and festivals.

"The Roses is already a brilliant community hub.

Now it's about reaching further being part of the fabric of everyday life in Tewkesbury Borough. Theatres make places vibrant and we want everyone to be a part of that."

Expect to see exciting changes at The Roses in 2026, and plenty of opportunities to get involved.

Access for all: a community effort in Tewkesbury

A new community-led group, the Tewkesbury Access Forum, is working to help make the borough more accessible for disabled people and those with prams or buggies.

Founded in April 2025, the forum brings together people with lived experience of disability to identify barriers in public spaces and encourage practical change.

One of its first goals is to create an accessibility leaflet for Tewkesbury town centre, available from the Church Street Visitor Centre from 2026.

The group meets bi-monthly at the Roses Theatre to review and give feedback. It has plans to expand across the borough, supporting shops, restaurants, hospitality and public services, and to become more inclusive. Elizabeth Peché, founder, said:



Shaping Garden Communities

Tewkesbury Borough is growing quickly in both its economy and population.

The council's Garden Communities team is committed to creating a sustainable place that meets the needs of the growing population. The borough is required to provide over 12,000 new homes by 2043, and the team aims to ensure there is a matching provision of employment uses, education, roads capacity, sustainable travel and community facilities.

North Ashchurch Consortium planning application

Momentum is building as the North Ashchurch Consortium (a group of land owners and developers who are working together to deliver sustainable communities) has submitted its planning application; this also includes a framework masterplan for the wider northern area of the development.

The application is being reviewed by the borough council's planning team to determine if it complies with planning policy. Planners will assess the application using the Government's updated rules called the National Planning Policy Framework (NPPF). The NPPF is a comprehensive guide for local planning authorities in England, detailing how they should approach planning decisions and policies sets out the Government's planning policies for England and how these should be applied.

This sets out what 'good planning' looks like, including things such as sustainability and housing needs, whilst ensuring that green spaces are protected. If applications meet these conditions requirements, they are more likely to be approved. As part of this process, consultations are taking place with key partners including the Environment Agency, NHS, and education authorities.

The proposals can be viewed directly on the consortium's website at northashchurch.com and the full planning application can be viewed on the council's planning portal, by searching for 'North Ashchurch' or using the application number 25/00490/OUT.

Feedback from consultees will also be available to view as it comes in.

New access map for Ashchurch for Tewkesbury Railway Station

Earlier this year, the Gloucestershire and Oxfordshire Community Rail Partnership (GOCRP) teamed up with local partners to explore how residents and businesses use Ashchurch for Tewkesbury Railway Station.

The project encouraged feedback from young people through community events at Northway Skate Park and Tewkesbury RFC, thanks to funding from Great Western Railways (GWR). The events offered free bike repairs and police security tagging to promote safe and sustainable travel.

As a result of this work, a brand-new access map has been created to help people with their personal travel choices and access needs to and from the station. It's designed to be easy for everyone to use, whether going to work, school, or visiting to enjoy all that Tewkesbury has to offer.

It also shows which routes are suitable for people who may have accessibility needs.
