Leader's update

With summer well underway, it's a great time to share what we have been working on, and how the council continues to support communities across Tewkesbury Borough during these busy and vibrant months.



Our focus remains on building strong, welcoming places where people can thrive. From careful planning for future growth to supporting local services, businesses and those who may need extra help, every part of our work is aimed at improving day-to-day life for all.

Engagement on the Strategic and Local Plan (SLP) has been a big focus. The views shared by residents and businesses will help us balance sustainable growth and protect the borough's character and heritage.

Work also continues with Local Government Reorganisation (LGR). Our refreshed Council Plan sets priorities around wellbeing, economic resilience and environmental care, ensuring any future changes support strong local decision-making and high-quality services.

We have also brought forward the next parish governance review. Significant development in recent years means some parish boundaries no longer reflect how communities have grown, and the pressure to build remains. With parish elections in 2027 and wider reorganisation ahead, it's important that arrangements remain fit for purpose, especially as parish areas will eventually be used as the building blocks for any new ward arrangements for the new unitary council.

We'll be working closely with our town and parish councils, elected representatives at all levels, community groups, and residents, with two formal consultation periods ahead of any final decisions.

Housing and homelessness prevention also remain central to our work. Through early support and partnership working, we're helping residents access safe, secure homes, preventing homelessness wherever possible.

I hope you can enjoy some of the many fantastic local events and activities over the summer and thank you for your continued support.

Parish life in... Wormington

Simon Browning, Clerk at Wormington Parish Council, tells us a bit about what makes this village special

Tell us a little about your parish and what makes it special

Wormington is a small parish of around 50 households, located about six miles north of Winchcombe and five miles south of Evesham. Mentioned in the Domesday Book, it had just eight houses in 1086.

For much of its history, Wormington consisted of two villages - Great and Little Wormington. The two villages were brought together in the late 18th century by Nathaniel Jeffreys, leading to the construction of a connecting road. A 14th century Grade II listed church, stands at the centre of the village, featuring medieval stained-glass windows and a Saxon carving of the crucifixion, making it well worth a visit.

Community and events and activities

In the summer, a temporary marquee acts as the focal point of the village where we enjoy putting on events.

The year begins with an Easter Egg hunt, followed by cream teas, boules, a BBQ, quiz nights, silent disco, and bar nights during the summer. These events really pull the local community together.

The role of the parish council

Wormington Parish Council was created in 2023 following the boundary review in 2022.

Our meetings are very active and everyone in the village has a vote. The presence of nearby national infrastructure plants keep us on our toes! County and neighbouring councillors regularly attend our meetings and are often surprised at our strong attendance and lively discussions!

Exciting development projects

Plans are underway to replace the temporary marquee with a semi-permanent structure, to allow year-round activities such as our fortnightly board games club.

A major upgrade to the nearby gas pumping station is planned, with construction expected to last around three years. Plans are also progressing to expand the neighbouring solar farm including new electrical cabling and a new substation just outside the village.

As you can see, there is a lot happening in Wormington!

Warm Spaces funding 2026/27

For the last three years, Tewkesbury Borough Council has supported community venues, to run Warm Spaces, offering residents a welcoming place to keep warm and talk, with some also offering refreshments. These spaces see over 12,500 visits each winter. Funding for winter 2026/27 will be advertised in early September at: tewkesbury.gov.uk/warm-spaces



Council Tax - support available in Tewkesbury Borough

With the cost of living continuing to rise, Tewkesbury Borough residents are encouraged to check whether they are eligible for council tax discounts, exemptions or financial support, to help ease pressure on household budgets.

Discounts

A range of council tax discounts is available including:

- A 25 per cent single person discount
- Discounts for full-time students, apprentices, and some carers
- Discounts or exemptions where someone in the home has a severe mental impairment, such as dementia, and meets certain criteria.

Property exemptions

Some properties qualify for full exemption, including:

- Homes left empty because the resident has moved into care
- Properties lived in only by students.
- Annexes lived in by dependent relatives.

Some empty properties may be eligible where major repairs or structural work are required.

Council Tax Reduction Scheme

Residents on a low income, or receiving certain benefits, may qualify for the Council Tax Reduction Scheme. Support is based on income, savings, and household circumstances - and homeowners or those in work may still qualify. Residents must report changes in circumstances including income.

Councillor Stewart Dove, Lead Member for Finance and Asset Management, said:



We want people to know what support is available, so they don't miss out. A quick check could identify help and make a real difference to a household budget. Anyone struggling is encouraged to contact our team for early advice and guidance.

Work on the Strategic and Local Plan (SLP) is continuing, with feedback from recent engagement residents, businesses, and partners, currently being reviewed to shape the next stage.

The SLP sets out the best options for housing and employment growth across Cheltenham Borough, Gloucester City, and Tewkesbury Borough, over the next 20 years.

Councillor Sarah Hands, Lead Member for Planning and Place Making, said:

The SLP will help create places that work for people, the environment, and the local economy.

With new housing proposals coming forward, it's essential to ensure that development happens in the right locations, and is supported by infrastructure such as roads, schools, and healthcare.

A further six-week engagement is planned for later in 2026, ahead of the government's end-of-year deadline.

Local Government reorganisation shaping Gloucestershire's future

Local Government Reorganisation (LGR) aims to streamline council structures, making services simpler, more efficient, and easier for residents to access and understand, while delivering better value for money.

What this means for Gloucestershire

In Gloucestershire, the county council and the six district councils were invited by the government to propose options for a new unitary council structure.

A unitary council is a single local authority responsible for all local government services within an area - such as waste collection, housing, education, highways, social care and planning, rather than responsibilities being split between district and county councils.

The proposals

Following this invitation, three proposals were submitted to the government:

1. A single unitary council for the whole county
2. Two unitary councils (east and west Gloucestershire)
3. Two unitary councils (Greater Gloucester and Gloucestershire Unitary)

Public consultation

Earlier this year, a public consultation was held across Gloucestershire, inviting residents, businesses, and organisations to share their views on the three proposals.

The government will make the final decision on the county's future structure - this could be one of the proposals, or a different fourth option - taking feedback from consultation into account.

The role of a shadow authority

Once a decision is made, a temporary body called a shadow authority will be set up for each unitary council that is to be created.

Made up of newly elected councillors, it will prepare for the new council's launch - setting budgets, appointing senior leaders, and ensuring services are ready to run smoothly. It will not run day-to-day services.

Elections for Gloucestershire's shadow authority/ies are expected in May 2027.



Devolution and what it means for Gloucestershire

Devolution is separate from local government reorganisation and involves powers being passed from central government to local areas. The aim is to give local leaders more control over key decisions affecting their area.

For Gloucestershire, this could mean creating a new strategic authority with neighbouring areas and could include partnerships with areas such as the West of England, Herefordshire and Worcestershire, led by a directly elected mayor.

What happens next

The government is expected to decide on Gloucestershire's future structure in summer 2026, with any new unitary council(s) starting from April 2028 at the earliest, following the shadow authority period.

In the meantime, all seven councils are working together to ensure services continue smoothly and residents, communities and businesses remain well supported.

Local Government Reorganisation is an evolving process, and new information will continue to emerge. All details in this article are correct at the time of printing.

Councillor Richard Stanley, Leader of Tewkesbury Borough Council, said:

Local Government Reorganisation and devolution are major changes, and we're working closely with our partners across Gloucestershire to prepare for what lies ahead. While decisions will be made nationally, our focus is on keeping services running smoothly and supporting our communities.

Our priority is to maintain strong services now while planning responsibly for the future - setting sound budgets, managing resources wisely, and making sure we're ready for any new arrangements.

While the Council Plan has been updated to reflect Local Government Reorganisation (LGR) and the likely move to a new unitary authority in 2028, its priorities remain clear - caring for communities, caring for the environment, and caring for place.

The council's 2026/27 budget supports these priorities and was approved with cross-party support. Despite ongoing financial pressures, council tax remains among the lowest nationally, whilst essential services, including waste collections, environmental health, and food safety continue to be protected.

Councillor Stewart Dove, Lead Member for Finance and Asset Management, said:

Despite ongoing financial pressures, this budget allows us to invest in key services, with additional funding to support Revenues and Benefits, Planning and our flood response, all while keeping council tax low.

The budget continues to support the Council Plan and will be reviewed as LGR progresses, helping prepare for the future.

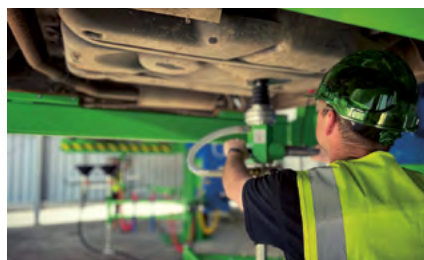

Managing garden waste doesn't need to be a chore. Hassle-free, fortnightly kerbside collections mean fewer trips to the recycling centre and no more messy car boots.

Cllr Murray Stewart, Lead Member for Environmental Services, explained:

Our popular service means you can easily compost everything from grass cuttings, clippings, weeds, leaves and twigs, to small branches and windfall fruit, but please remember not to add food or pet waste.

Membership runs from 1 April to 31 March and costs £60 a year. Whether someone needs one brown wheelie bin or more, contact the Customer Services team to sign up, or renew online.

Shaping a resilient future

A new Climate Change Framework is guiding the council's work across planning, housing, and community development.

Seasonal flooding has always shaped life here and as weather patterns intensify, preparing for increased extremes of weather - particularly flooding - remains a priority. This means protecting residents, businesses and making sure services keep running.

What the council is doing?

- Introduced new 'Tree and Woodland Management' and 'Hedgerow' policies
- Generating renewable energy and using low-carbon fuels
- Supporting improved EV charging, cycle routes, and home-retrofit schemes.

The council is committed to protecting and improving the natural environment, with plans like the Local Nature Recovery Strategy helping to restore of landscapes, support wildlife, and use nature-based solutions to reduce flood risk.

Councillor Cate Cody, Lead Member for Climate and Ecology, said:

Our Climate Change Framework is just the start. We're working together to build a strong and resilient future for our communities.

How community growing spaces are bringing people together

Norton Growing Space Community Interest Company (CIC) and Winchcombe Community Allotment are flourishing examples of how growing together can bring communities to life. Both projects have benefited from Coronation Living Heritage Fund (CHLF) Community Growing and Community Orchards grants.

The sites offer welcoming, hands-on gardening opportunities. People of all ages learn practical food-growing skills, enjoy the seasons, and join regular meet-ups for sowing, watering, weeding, mowing, and planting.

This spring, Norton's 1000 Seeds Project has been supported by a £996 grant, with local schoolchildren helping to raise seedlings that will be planted at the farm. Sweetcorn, squashes, climbing beans and sunflowers will be grown in six no-dig beds. A further £1,995 Community Orchards grant has funded 25 new fruit trees at Norton, including Gloucestershire Underleaf apple and Blaisdon Red plum trees, to create a long-term supply for residents and wildlife.

Winchcombe Community Allotment received £799 to add five fruit trees, including cherry, almond and Gloucestershire apple varieties, and for essential tools. Anyone can join in and share the harvest, and surplus produce is often donated to a local day nursery.

These projects show how shared growing spaces help people connect - with each other, with nature, and with their food - while creating lasting benefits for local wildlife.

Royal visit highlights vital work supporting victims of domestic abuse

Her Majesty The Queen visited the Gloucestershire Domestic Abuse Support Service (GDASS) earlier this year, recognising the crucial support the service provides to victims and survivors.

The visit followed an invitation from Cllr Liz Skelt, Churchdown St Johns ward, who met Her Majesty at the Royal Garden Party last year.

Councillor Liz Skelt explained:

“The team at GDASS work tirelessly to help as many people as possible. I hope this visit encourages more people to seek help and highlights the serious and lasting impact domestic abuse can have.”

Tewkesbury Borough Council works closely with GDASS and other local and national organisations, including Refuge, Women’s Aid and Shelter, to ensure anyone experiencing domestic abuse can access the right support when they need it.

These partnerships are essential in providing advice, protection, and practical help.

The council can also offer direct support to victims and survivors, including help with moving home, making properties safer, and signposting to financial and legal advice.

This work is carried out alongside community safety, health, and voluntary sector organisations, to raise awareness, support early intervention and help people live safely and independently.

New Housing and Homelessness Prevention Strategy agreed

The council has agreed its new Housing and Homelessness Prevention Strategy, setting out how it will support residents and reduce homelessness through to 2028.

To shape the new plan, the council gathered insights from workshops held with government representatives, councillors, officers, and partner organisations. A draft was then shared for public engagement with the feedback helping to refine the final strategy.

Cllr Alex Hegenbarth, Lead Member for Housing and Homelessness, said:

“This strategy strengthens our commitment to preventing homelessness wherever we can. There is a strong focus on early intervention, supporting people as soon as problems begin, and working closely with partners to get the best results for residents.”

“By working together, we can give residents the support they need and help to make sure everyone has a safe place to call home.”

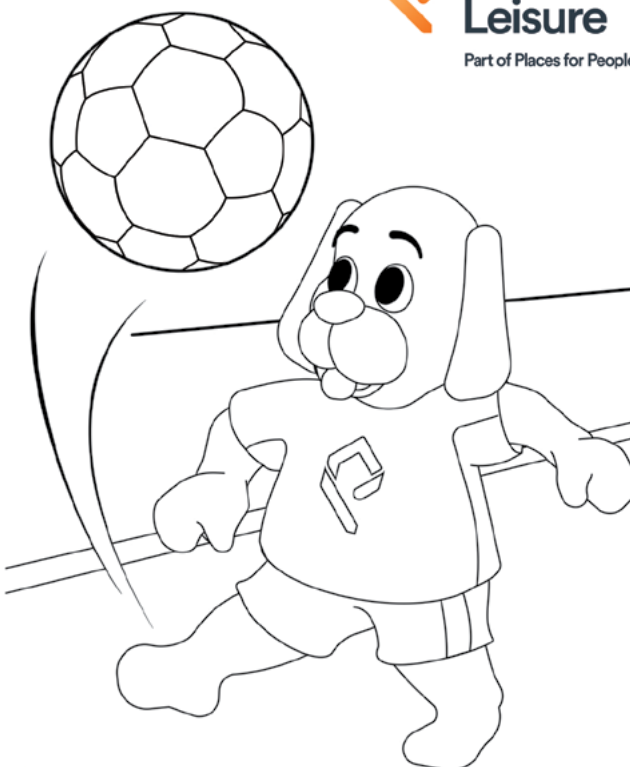

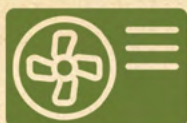
